2023 Community Report











2023 was a year of growth and impact. One of the most visible changes was our rebranding to Colorado Gives Foundation—a name that reflects the trust and connection Coloradans have with Colorado Gives Day. While our name changed, our mission did not. We are still a community foundation working to connect people, ideas and nonprofits whether through our

focused work in Jefferson County (Jeffco) or our statewide efforts. Everything we do is driven by a goal to make good happen.

Building Resilient Communities in Jeffco

In Jeffco, we're dedicated to building a resilient and connected community where everyone can thrive. We support local nonprofits through grantmaking and foster connections between people, businesses and nonprofits. In 2023, we proudly awarded over \$10 million in grants to nonprofits that are working to ensure everyone in Jeffco can thrive.

One of our most significant initiatives is the Bring it Home Fund, created to address the rising cost of housing—an issue that's impacting our neighbors, communities and even our economy. With \$15 million in seed funding and additional support from donors, the fund is already making a difference. Through investments in the Colorado Housing Accelerator Initiative (CHAI) and Foothills Regional Housing, we're increasing the supply of housing that's affordable for middle-income households.

This work is about more than numbers. It's about people-like the recent college graduate who grew up in Jeffco but was priced out of the housing market and couldn't 'return' home.

Thanks to these investments, we're creating opportunities for individuals, like our recent college graduate, and families to come home to live and raise their kids in Jeffco and build their futures.

Our Statewide Impact

Beyond Jeffco, our focus statewide is to build the capacity of donors and nonprofits to maximize their impact. ColoradoGives.org, our online giving platform, is at the heart of this effort, making it easy and joyful for donors to support any of the thousands of verified nonprofits across the state.

2023 was a remarkable year for giving to nonprofits. Coloradans came together and donated \$69.2 million through ColoradoGives. org, with \$54.2 million donated on Colorado Gives Day alone. Additionally, our donor advised funds (DAFs) proved to be a powerful tool for giving, facilitating \$7.7 million in grants to nonprofits. Acting as a charitable savings account, DAFs allow donors to put money in, receive the full taxable deduction allowable by law, and then use the fund to support the nonprofit causes they care about.

We also introduced new business-giving products to help businesses connect with local causes. These achievements are a testament to the commitment and generosity of our donors, partners and businesses. We're excited for what lies ahead.

Our Vision for a Thriving Jeffco

\$10 Million+ granted

Essential Needs

It's hard to thrive when you cannot meet your most essential needs.

We supported immediate needs and long-term solutions to drive better access to food, housing, safety and health care (physical, dental and mental) for Jeffco residents.

Economic Prosperity

When all our neighbors are economically secure, everyone benefits.

We worked to create good-paying jobs and help our neighbors find and keep them. This included ensuring everyone has access to quality education, from early childhood through high school, along with job training and skill-building opportunities.

Resilient & Connected Neighborhoods

When people are connected to each other in community, they generate the ability to solve their problems together to make neighborhoods and communities thrive – we call this resiliency or social capital.

We supported community-driven and initiated projects to protect community assets and to make neighborhoods safe, welcoming and inclusive across generations.



Civic Engagement

When more people know how our government works and how people live together in a community, we get closer to creating communities that work for everyone.

We supported civic education through: active participation in local community organizations, clubs and events; volunteerism; access to reliable information; youth engagement; public forums; voting accessibility; civic mentorship; leadership and arts/cultural engagement.
